V. ELAINE GROSS - FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT EMERITA OF ERASE RACISM



V. Elaine Gross is Founder, President Emerita, and a Board Member of ERASE Racism, the regional civil rights organization based on New York’s Long Island. She served as President for 21 years (2001-2022) and recently returned at the request of the Board to assume the duties of the President on a temporary basis. ERASE Racism has received extensive regional and national media attention for its cutting-edge, research-based, policy advocacy and programs that expose and address the devastating impact of historical and ongoing structural racism.

The Seat of Action: Long Island in the American Revolution and Beyond (History Museum) Part of LIM’s America250 celebration, discover the experiences of the Long Island region during the Revolutionary War through a rich array of artifacts and paintings.

50 Years of Apple Computers: The Kevin Lenane Collection (Art Museum) Explore the most complete collection of Apple computers in the United States including a rare 1976 Apple-1 computer and artifacts from Apple’s groundbreaking Lisa and Mac development projects of the 1980s.

LI Gamers (Art Museum) Explore how Long Islanders have contributed to the history of video game development.

Colors of Long Island: Student Art Exhibition (History Museum) Celebrate the creativity of Long Island’s young artists, featuring artworks from hundreds of students in grades Pre-K through 12th grade.

The Carriage Museum: Step back in time and explore the Museum’s Carriage galleries, displaying approximately 100 horse-drawn vehicles, including some of the most historic vehicles in any United States collection.
